

First of all, I was surprised by the title, using the word "dumb" was not a well thought out move. Maybe "insensitive" would have been a better choice, but then that gave a good idea of what was to come once inside the cover. A very obvious and critical mistake is that there is no

bibliography or any sort of citation for this book. Everything written is the personal opinion of the author. Therefore, in journalism terms, it is a complete work of fiction. It does not matter how well meaning it is, without supporting evidence, it should be given the same credence of any talking head seen on one of the cable news channels. This is a very unprofessional way to write on a topic that is this important. Without proper support this belittles the theme and those who are a part of the communities she claims to support. The more I read, it appeared to be a thesis, and yet, no credible institute of higher learning would accept any paper without support and documentation. It is all her personal experiences and views. It also has a very condescending tone throughout. Again, what a very unprofessional way to write in trying to educate people.
